# President's message

As I write this, our 2023 Family Boat Build was completed just last week. More on the event inside. There was nothing particularly unusual about this year, except that one week before the event, it became obvious that we had no place to hold it! We had planned to use the Green Anchors event tent as we did last year. That tent was demolished by the snow last winter, and its replacement was delayed by several breakdowns and other issues.

With just a week to change course, we went to "Plan B" which was a "tent city" we erected in front of a drastically rearranged RiversWest shop. We put out a call for 10X10 pop-up picnic canopies and volunteers to move everything possible off the shop floor. In the end, members came up with 3 more canopies than we could use and we completely rearranged the shop in a day. Our helpful neighbors at Green Anchors cleared out extra space for us. None of the families even knew about the emergency.

It is especially gratifying to see the kids getting such joy and sense of pride creating a boat from a pile of wood in just two days. This year, one builder was a bit older. In his retirement, he had talked often of wanting to build a boat. His family discovered the Family Boat Build and made it happen.

One of the most difficult jobs I have at RiversWest is talking with the many people who offer various materials, plans, books, and boats. Mostly, these offers are welcome and greatly appreciated, but we can't accept everything that is offered. Too often, the offers come about because someone never quite fulfilled their dream or ran out of time to finish. It is heartbreaking to have to say that we can't finish that boat their loved one dreamed of building. It serves as a reminder of the importance of deciding what we want in life, and of getting on with it.

On a personal note, my wife and I have been thinking along those lines. We have decided we need to be nearer to salt water—it gets in your veins. I have notified the RiversWest board that I cannot stand for re-election as your president for another year. We expect to move somewhere along the Salish Sea in the next few months.

I am excited for new adventures, but my one real regret in leaving the Portland area is that I will be leaving RiversWest. It has been incredibly rewarding to serve you. - **Mitch West**

This demo explained the basics of taking sights on heavenly bodies with a sextant, use of chronometers to accurately record the time of the sight, and application of Nautical Almanac and tables to determine one's latitude and longitude when in open ocean. Despite widespread use of GPS, it is always advisable to be capable of finding one's position when crossing an ocean using celestial navigation. The Riverswest library has many books on the subject.



**Auk** - (7' 10" x 4' 2"), designed by lain Oughtred, builder: Mitch West

Auk is both lain Oughtred's design and the name this tubby little dinghy will carry aboard my tubby little trawler, "Puffin". Seemed appropriate. Planking complete; turned for cleanup, framing, fitting out, and finishing. The hull is primed with one coat of epoxy primer. This helps to see what needs fairing, and allows the use of epoxy fairing compound that can't be used over paint.

Prior to priming, the sheer strake and transom were sealed with penetrating epoxy, so any drips or bleed-through of white primer aren't permanent.

### MODIFICATIONS/UPGRADES - ADDING A MOTOR WELL FOR A JOHN DORY by Russ Smith

When I built my boat some 7 years ago there was an option drawn by the designer for a motor well. Since I have not been using the boat very much because of my lack of sailing training, I thought the motor might be a good option. The plan called out 3/8" plywood for the box walls with a double layer where the motor clamps on. I also thought it would be a good idea to be able to lift the motor in case of grounding. I made a sliding section with runners inside that allows the motor to be raised. The box is re-enforced with 1" square Mahogany corner pieces inside and around the base. The box is epoxied to the bottom and secured with bronze screws though the bottom up into the base.

After the initial test launch I had a new issue; the tiller interferes with the motor housing. Chuck Stuckey lent his 2.5 hp motor and in the first sea trial the boat moved very easily through the water, but using a shortened tiller was a real challenge. After many member consultations and suggestions as well as looking at a system from 1910 in "Wooden Boat" magazine, I developed a rope steering system that is attached to the gunwales around the motor. It has only been driveway tested so far, but I plan to test in the water later this week - fingers crossed!

# REPLACING GASOLINE OUTBOARD WITH ELECTRIC OUTBOARD by Chuck Stuckey

Although my Shellback dinghy is an excellent row boat (and a darn sweet little sailboat) I've felt a need for a motor as I use the boat as a tender to the family sailboat and sometimes the distance from boat to shore was a bit much. My first solution was a 2.5 hp Suzuki four stroke. That worked well but it had a few downsides. It was heavier than advertised, was difficult to move from the stern rail to the dinghy in the water, and was not easy for guests to operate. So I was looking for an alternative.

After a little online research I was ready to take the plunge to electric. First, I sold my Suzuki to Russ (on his boat we can both report it works great). Next I bought my set up: a 55 lb. thrust trolling motor, a 50 amp hour lithium battery, and a 12 watt solar charger. The whole package was just over \$400. The motor has a relatively short, 24 inch shaft - not one of those long things typical with trolling motors. It's called their "kayak" model, the brand is Newport, ordered from Amazon.



The solar charger is about the size of a sheet of paper with a controller built in to prevent overcharging. It works great and will top off the battery very quickly. The battery weighs only 10 lbs, about a third of what a lead acid battery weighs. All in all: a nifty little set up.

And it performs well. It has six forward speeds but on my first trial, I only used the first three. It is plenty fast enough for a spin around the marina. What a wonderful new, modern world it is.

# Shop rental rate schedule

The new rate starting June 1 or 6 months after lease begins shall be calculated as follows: Monthly rent =  $$50 + $1.25 \times (Length \times Beam)$ . Electric power is included. Minimal use of a small, radiant heater to aid epoxy curing will be allowed while the user is in the shop. Space heaters will not be allowed.

The shop manager is Russ Smith. For questions or problems, text Russ at 360-606-9675 or email Russ at fitzsmith67@gmail.com. Contact Russ to obtain a copy of the rental agreement or to discuss the start of your boat building project.

Note: The rate will be evaluated and adjusted in the future when necessary. Signed leases have a fixed rate for a 12 month period or shorter, if requested by leasee. Rents are due on or prior to the 1st of each calendar month; if a lease is signed during the month, the rent will be pro-rated for the remainder of that month and initial payment will be for the pro-rated period plus the next full month, due when the lease is signed.

## Rules for Shop Use, Boat Building, and Safety

The liability waiver we all signed with our membership should always be viewed as a starting point; we owe some responsibility to each other as well. The tools and power equipment the shop provides are for all to use. Please use them properly; not doing so is dangerous and the resulting damage, if any, is expensive for all of us. And remember a clean shop is a safe shop. Our policy on Boat Shop use is posted in the Shop. Members or renters can obtain a key for access.


## **Library News - Good News from the library!** by Bruce Goodrich
